Principal's Report

It was been wonderful to have all our year levels return to school over the past two weeks. Seeing the joy of the students reconnecting with their peers and teachers in our school environment has been heartwarming.

The staggered returned to school will finish tomorrow, with all our year levels returning to onsite learning from Monday, November 1st.

Can parents please limit their entry to the school grounds, entering only when necessary. Having plans in place with your children in relation to which gate you would like them to exit from at the end of each school day, will assist with this matter. Any adults entering any of our buildings, including the front office must check in and be wearing a mask. We thank you in advance for your co-operation with these important matters.

In addition to receiving a prize pack of books, our year 6 students have won a virtual visit from Australian Children's Author, Nat Amoore. The virtual visit is scheduled for Thursday, November 11th. This was not the only literary prize recently claimed by Shuao. He also submitted a piece into the poem and short story competition by Casey Cardinia Library. He received 3rd place in the age 12 - 15 category with his poem, 'Skater's boot ache.' The poem together with an additional report from Shuao is featured further on in our newsletter. Congratulations Shuao, great effort.

Recently we received the news allowing us the opportunity to conduct our transition program for our 2022 Prep students to be onsite. Staff are busy organising sessions, enabling the children to participate in a school based program. Information will be

distributed to parents of enrolled students very soon.

Planning for 2022 is well underway. Next week families will be receiving information regarding book packs and parent payments for 2022. Due to changes in Department of Education policy the process for purchasing our year level book packs has changed. The major change for our families is the manner in which the packs are ordered and paid for. If families are wanting to purchase the book packs, all orders need to placed and paid for online by Monday, December 13th, 2021. All information will be posted on Compass next week. With the resumption of all our students back to school, once again the issue of traffic and road safety becomes crucial around our school in the peak periods before and after school. The safety of our students is of paramount importance and this is the responsibility of every adult, whether they are a driver or a pedestrian.

Courtesy, patience and common sense play an important role in ensuring all of our students are kept safe during these times of peak traffic. It is also important to remember that our school crossings and their supervisors are provided to support our students and families. I would urge parents to set a good example or reinforce to their children the safe use of the crossings.

Some key points about using the crossings are:

- children and adults who are using the crossing must comply with the supervisor's directions
- always stand behind the yellow line until directed by the supervisor to cross
- do not ride bikes, scooters or skate, run or bounce balls walk quickly and safely
- cars are not allowed to park on or around the crossing this clearance area is for everyone's safety
- always stay within the lines of the crossing and walk in front of the supervisor so they can see all students
- always be alert and listen to what the supervisor says.

In the interests of all members of our school community, I would ask that we give student safety our constant thought and highest priority.

Interview with Shuao by Thanmay

Tell us about your achievements during Remote Learning.

I came upon the video competition as part of the Premier's Reading Challenge and my Mum encouraged me to do it. After a few days I chose my book which was 47 Degrees by Justin D'Ath. I chose this book because it was different to what I usually read. It is relevant to Australia and bushfires and it was educational. It was the type of book I would encourage others to read. I recorded it and edited it using Movie Maker. Then submitted it with the help of Miss Macmillan. Then we found out a month later, when my Mum got the call with the good news that I had won the Year 5/6 Division of the video category. Part of my prize is the Year Sixes will now get to participate in a virtual author visit.

When I found out about the competition through the Doveton Library, I was only planning to write a short story. I decided to write the poem as we had written poetry as part of remote learning. We analysed poets and I used Shel Silevstein as my mentor text. I edited the poem and then submitted the story as well. I was lucky enough to come third in my category for my poem and the story was unsuccessful. I am not sure of the prize, but the poem was published to the website.

What was your reaction when you got top 3 in both competitions?

I was shocked when I found out the results within two days.

What motivated you during Remote Learning with the competitions?

I had the Public Speaking competition at school just prior to lockdown where I spoke to all of Year Six and was lucky enough to be chosen then to represent the school which will be on the 14th November. This made me realise if I put in the effort, I can be successful at things.

What is the best piece of advice you can give to the students of PLPS?

Keep trying. I have participated in many competitions and have been unsuccessful, but sometimes you may be lucky enough. If you don't give something a shot, there will be no chance to know if you can win and succeed.
