Year 3 Inquiry

The Year 3 students have been exploring heat throughout our Science unit called 'The Heat Is On'.


Students have been safety conducting heat themed science experiments that focus on how heat energy can be produced, conducted and transferred.

What materials insulate?

For this experiment students were given a range of materials to choose from and an ice cube. The aim of the experiment was to create the best insulator to keep your ice cube from melting

"We keep warm by using a blanket as an insulator" Zara, Emaleigh and Ivy






"We used cotton balls because wool is an insulator" **Boston and Alisa**

How does heat change?

For this experiment students learnt how to measure heat using a thermometer. They discovered that overtime boiling water will cool and become the same temperature as the room it is in.

What are the sources of heat?

For this experiment students learnt how heat energy can be produced through 3 sources- kinetic, electrical and chemical.





How is heat transferred?

The aim of the experiment was to discover which material was the best conductor of heat. Whilst doing so, students learnt how heat energy is transferred from one object to another.

Round 4 of the Get Active Kids Voucher Program is NOW OPEN!

Do your children love sport and getting active? You may be eligible for up to \$200 to put towards the cost associated with your child's sport and active recreation activities.

To be eligible children must be Victorian residents, aged 18 and under and named on a valid Health Care Card or Pensioner Concession Card, as well as Medicare card.

Additionally, special consideration also applies for children residing in care services as well as temporary or provisional visa holders, undocumented migrants or international students. Please refer to the Program Guidelines for more information.

The Get Active Kids Voucher Program helps eligible families get their kids involved in organised sport and active recreation activities by providing financial support for the cost of membership and registration fees. Eligible children may be able to receive up to \$200 each.

Sporting pursuits, swimming lessons and outdoor active recreation programs are examples of eligible activities under the Program.

The Program encourages kids to re-engage or to participate for the first time in new activities by reducing the cost of participation which can be a significant barrier to participation.

You can claim one voucher per eligible child in round 4.

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

Harmony Week

Harmony Week is celebrated in the week of 21st – 27th March. The aim of Harmony Week is to recognise diversity and multiculturalism in Australian through inclusive activities. Harmony Week is all about inclusiveness, respect and belonging for all Australians, regardless of cultural or linguistic background. The theme is **"everyone belongs"**. At PLPS, students will be taking part in activities that promote inclusiveness and the theme of "everyone belongs".

Preps are learning about diversity in families and making buddies.

Year 1 students have being reading about how we are all different and making a "people" display to show that even though they we are all different, we all belong.

Year 2 students will be making a Harmony Day display around this year's theme "Everyone Belongs".



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Year 4 students will be mapping their ancestry or country of origin on a cohort world map. They will also create a "Everyone Belongs in Year 4" banner where we acknowledge the different races, cultures, backgrounds and religions we have.

Each Year 5 student traced around their hand and decorated it. All hands were then put into a peace sign display with a banner reading "We are all different and special" "Everyone belongs". We discussed what Harmony Day represents and why it is important to celebrate it!



Each day the Year 6 students, as part of their Community Meets, will be reading texts that link to diversity, perspective and exclusion. Students will be discussing these themes during the week and linking these ideas to our History unit which explores immigration, including the challenges faced by refugees and asylum seekers.

Orange is the colour chosen to represent Harmony Week. Traditionally, orange signifies social communication and meaningful conversations. It also relates to the freedom of ideas, and encouragement and mutual respect. Students can choose to wear as splash of orange tomorrow Friday 25th March, on our Free Dress Day to show their support for cultural diversity and an inclusive Australia and celebrate Harmony Week.



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The Classy Classroom Project Team aims to find ways to make sure that our classrooms are a great place for learning. It's about feeling safe in your classroom environment, knowing that it's okay to ask for help if you need it, having a go and being supported by your classmates. It's also about feeling comfortable - having an orderly environment and feeling that you belong. At the beginning of each school year, students become familiar with our school values; what they mean and what they look like in the classroom; INTEGRITY, RESPONSIBILITY, TOLERANCE, REPSECT AND CO-OPERATION. Each year level also develops their classroom expectations at the beginning of each year in collaboration with the students.
